


Childhood during The Second World War – Part 1

Key Facts

- The Second World War lasted for 6 years, from 1939 to 1945.
- There were many countries fighting against each other on two sides – the Allies and the Axis powers.
- Many British children were evacuated to the countryside from cities and ports for safety.
- Some children stayed at home or came back and experienced the Blitz.
- There were many ways that people tried to keep safe during air raids e.g. blackouts and using shelters.

Anderson shelters were half buried in the ground. They were dark, damp and very cramped.



Vocabulary

- air raid** – bombs being dropped by enemy aircraft, mostly on cities
- Allied powers** – the countries fighting on the same side as the UK during WWII
- Anderson shelters** – shelters people built outside their houses to hide and protect themselves from air raids
- Axis powers** – the countries the UK and the Allies were fighting against
- blackouts** – where everyone turned off their lights so Axis aircraft couldn't see where the cities/ports were at night
- the Blitz** – a time where Britain was being bombed by the Axis powers
- evacuation** – moving children to the countryside to be safe from air raids



Many homes and buildings were destroyed during the Blitz, especially in London. Thousands of people were injured and killed.

There were lots of accidents during blackouts because people couldn't see where they were going. Posters like this one reminded people to be careful in the dark.



Timeline

1 September 1939 – evacuation starts

3 September 1939 – the UK declares that it is going to war against the Axis powers

1940 – the Blitz starts

1941 – the Blitz ends

1945 – World War II ends
